Growing in Christlikeness

LIFE EXPECTANCY IS MORE THAN NUMBERS

Life expectancy usually refers to the quantity of our years. That can vary dramatically due to prenatal care, early childhood care, location, wars, plagues, race, gender, and other factors. Right now, people in America can expect on average to live into their 70's. That is an interesting statistic in view of Psalm 90:10, where Moses wrote: "The years of our life are seventy, or even by reason of strength eighty." Everyone who gets beyond 70 is in the "bonus" round!

Life expectancy should also be about the quality of our years. I am not talking about how good we feel although that is important, too; I am talking about how well we live. Moses told us in that same verse that life would be tough: "Yet their span is but toil and trouble; they are soon gone, and we fly away." He also said in Psalm 90:12, "Teach us to number our days that we may get a heart of wisdom." He was not talking about a careful count of birthdays; he was talking about a careful use of every day. Someone has well said, Don't just add years to your life; add life to your years! That applies to people of all ages. But life is short at best. In light of eternity, it is all so very short. Even if we become a triple digit wonder who lives to be a centenarian, life is relatively brief. It is just a blip on the EKG of human history. James put it this way: "You are a mist that appears for a little time and then vanishes." (James 4:14) Be ready for the next life by receiving Jesus in this life - and then by living like it. Simon Peter said, "Grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. To Him be the glory both now and to the day of eternity. Amen." (2 Peter 3:18) Don't just live; live well! Let's make the most of life here and hereafter as we grow in His grace for His glory!

A New Direction for our Deacon Ministry by Rev. Dr. Brad Klostreich

This year has been one of changes here at Palm City Presbyterian. We've seen changes in leadership, changes in ministry, as well as changes in some of our structures. Last spring I approached our Deacons about a new way of looking at their ministry.

Traditionally, our Deacon ministry has focused on giving assistance to local mission projects here in Martin County. We've helped out organizations such as House of Hope, Refuge Ranch, CareNet, and many others. We've helped both financially as well as engaged in service. These are important ministries in our area that serve those with less resources or have experienced great loss and hardship in life. It's important that we continue to engage in these important community para-church organizations.

However, the traditional role of Deacon ministry, both biblically and historically, is that of Pastoral Care. Which is why our Deacon ministry, beginning with 2017 is changing its mission focus to that of focusing on the needs and cares of our congregation. We will still continue to support our great local mission causes like House of Hope and the Salvation Army, but will do so from within our Missions Team headed by Elder Sue Henrich. The Missions Team, which historically has focused solely on foreign missions, will now be responsible for local missions as well. Our Deacons will focus on our people.

Each member of our church will be 'assigned' to a Deacon who will hopefully be in contact with you in the following weeks.

The model verse for our new Deacon ministry comes from Ezekiel 34:16 "I will *search* for the lost and *bring back* the strays. I will *bind up* the injured and *strengthen* the weak, but the sleek and the strong I will *watch over* and shepherd with justice." NRSV.

This verse shows us five principles for Pastoral Care within a local congregation.

- 1. To lead to Christ those who are lost. Luke 14:23
- 2. To restore to Christ those who have fallen away. Luke 15:4
- 3. To heal those who are wounded. 2 Corinthians 2:7-8
- 4. To strengthen those who are weak. Luke 22:31
- 5. To guard those who are strong. John 21:17

Some of our Deacons will be strong in some areas but weak in others. Some of the needs of our people will force certain deacons to focus on some areas to the exclusion of others. But all of our people fit into at least one (possibly more) of the above categories.

Look for a contact with your new deacon in the upcoming weeks ahead. Share with them how your spiritual journey is going. Share what your needs are. Let them care for you in the way Jesus shepherded his sheep.

Mission Statement 2.0 by Rev. Dr. Brad Klostreich

Last month I shared some thoughts about our new Mission Statement for Palm City Presbyterian ; "To unite with Christ and make him known." I mentioned some of the defining characteristics of a good organizational mission statement. This month, I'd like to look at what it means to 'unite' with Christ. Most Christians have a concept of what it means to 'know about' Christ. We might even understand the difference of what it means to 'know' Christ. But what does it mean to 'unite' with Christ?

One of the greatest theologians in church history who is the most underrated was the English Puritan John Owen. He lived in the 18th century and is sometimes referred to as the "English Calvin". His definitive work is entitled "Communion with God" where he expounds the importance of being united to the Triune God in Father, Son and Holy Spirit. It's a difficult work to read because Owen exclusively wrote in Latin which doesn't always translate into English with much readability.

Paul stated in I Corinthians 1:9 that God the Father calls us "...into the fellowship of his Son, Jesus Christ our Lord." This is one of the key verses describing the importance of being in relationship to Christ. However, as I said last month, this relationship is built on knowledge, not just experience. You can't relate to someone whom you know nothing about. Knowing about Jesus is more than just knowing what He did and what He said. It involves knowing about His attributes and His traits. It involves knowing about His deity, His omniscience, His passive and active work of obedience. So we start with our knowledge of who Jesus is in our endeavor to be in His 'fellowship'. To become a Christian is to have fellowship with Christ and enjoy all the benefits of what He has accomplished for us. Jesus himself invited those who trust in Him to 'sit and eat' with Him.

One of the most frequent descriptions of a believer in the New Testament is that they are a man or woman who is "in" Christ. That preposition makes a difference. Most of the Apostles use this language. Paul uses the same terminology in His writings. Paul even goes so far as to describe the union between a believer and Christ as similar to that union that happens only between a man and a woman within the context of marriage. Christians are even called the "bride" of Christ. In the same way that a man and woman become "one flesh", the New Testament picks up the same concept in describing the one-ness between Christ and His church. The picture of oneness in the Old Testament comes to fruition or fulfillment in the New Testament.

Not only do we have a knowledge of who Jesus is, but we have an affection for Him. Owen stated that there is "endless, bottomless, boundless grace and compassion in Christ, a fullness of grace in the human nature of Christ." I know that it is possible to obey the commands of God and not be a Christian. Atheists believe commandments such as "Thou shalt not steal." Jonathan Edwards called this aspect of obedience "Civic Virtue". But the reason we obey is not because we have a love or affection for Jesus, but rather we have a love and affection for ourselves. Sometimes we do noble or sacrificial things not out of a love for Christ, but because of how those acts make us look in the eyes of others. We want to appear noble and caring even when we are not so inwardly.

Early in my journey into Reformed Theology I heard a great series of questions related to love for Christ.

Do you love Christ perfectly? Do you love Christ the way you should? Do you love Christ at all?

Anyone who has ever sinned cannot claim to love Christ perfectly because their sin cancels out their perfection. So the answer to the first question is "no." The Bible commands us to love Christ perfectly and since we've just established that we don't love Him perfectly, the answer to the second question is also "no". That leaves one more. Only you and God know whether you love Christ at all. It is entirely possible to perform all the outward manifestations of that love and yet not have love on the inside. Jesus warns at the end of his Sermon on the Mount that many will "come to me in that day saying, 'Lord, Lord, did we not prophesy in your name, and in your name drive out demons and perform many miracles?" There are people who are involved at a high level in the mission of the church; even to the point of performing miracles. Jesus response to them is that they have only been pretending to love Him. "Then he will tell them plainly, 'I never knew you. Away from me,

The power of listening. Some time ago, I was given the opportunity to share a message with the congregation entitled "The Art of Listening". The purpose of this message was to highlight the value of listening to (vs. simply hearing) God. Similarly, I am reminded of how important this same skill is within our relationships. Simply hearing someone speak often leads to misunderstandings. Whereas listening to someone validates their experience and allows for effective communication.

The presence of dysfunction. On this side of heaven, we all will struggle with some form of dysfunction in our lives. For teens and adults, this could be addictions to technology, status, substances, and so forth. Pretending like we do not struggle with things will not make the struggle disappear. Instead, when we acknowledge our shortcomings to a trusted brother or sister in Christ and bring His light into the darkness, we open ourselves to begin the recovery process.

The possibility for change. Through Christ's transformative power and personal dedication, coupled with supportive Christian community, we can change. Understanding these principles and utilizing a few tools can save marriages, repair sibling relationships, help friendships, and better ourselves.


My prayer for us all is that we will engage each other in active listening, humble openness, and
