Ready or Not, Here Come the Holidays

Allow me to offer three suggestions for the holidays that benefit, not only those who grieve, but all of us.



Make worship primary.

Whether you host a dozen parties and entertain hundreds of guests or you decide not to decorate or send cards this year, make worship your focus. During November I will be preaching a series called "The Joy of a Thankful Heart." In December we will celebrate the Incarnation and birth of the eternal Son of God. If you are in a festive spirit, don't miss the main idea. If you are blue, nothing cures a hurting heart like giving thanks and praise.

Set reasonable expectations for yourself.

If you are grieving, it is OK to say no to things you don't feel like doing. You don't have to cook that big turkey dinner or send all those cards or even watch football. If you enjoy decorating, decorate. If you want to go to the party, go. But give yourself permission to take the holidays at your own pace.

Set reasonable expectations for the holidays

We go through seasons in our lives, and the holidays change. Christmas with small children in the house is different from Christmas with an empty nest. Try not to measure this year against other years. Instead, receive it as a gift from God. I suspect most of the emotional difficulty we have with the holidays comes from setting unreasonable expectations: "I'm supposed to feel _____, but I don't." Let that kind of thinking go. Embrace the true meaning of each holiday and accept it as a gift God has given you: "This year, whatever my circumstances, I will give thanks to God. This year, I will celebrate the birth of his Son."

If you are grieving, because of a death, divorce, or other loss, consider attending our Coping with the Holidays Grief Workshop. Saturday, November 4, at 10:00am in Lower Langill. Valette Porter and I will talk about the grieving process, the hope we have in Christ, and offer practical strategies for navigating the holiday season. This year Christmas Eve falls on a Sunday. We will have a combined worship service in the morning at 10:00am in the sanctuary. We will have a contemporary service in the evening at 5:00pm and a traditional service at 8:00pm.

Deacons Refocus Pastoral Care

Last January, the Deacons of Palm City Presbyterian Church changed their service focus from local missions to pastoral care of members, to more closely align with the deacon model found in the New Testament. To ensure that local missions were not slighted, the Mission Committee of the Session took on extra responsibility.

Initially, each deacon took one or two of the geographic areas already served by the church's Shepherds and made contact with members on the Shepherds' lists to find out what their needs were. After some trial and error, the deacons have decided, with the leadership of our new senior pastor, that a more effective way to meet the needs of the congregation would be to focus on the specific types of needs of the members. We will still be coordinating with the Shepherds, but won't be using the list of members that belong to the Shepherds to guide offering services. Currently, the deacons are forming pastoral care teams that will focus on specific areas of need such as:

- members who are caregivers for parents, spouses, or children—whatever the need that demands extra time and attention at home and can readily lead to "caregiver burnout"
- members who are homebound or in hospitals, rehab facilities, nursing homes, or assisted living housing
- new members of the PCPC "family" who would like help getting acquainted and possibly getting involved in

church activities (e.g., greeter at the door before services start)

- members who have recently lost loved ones and are grieving and need someone to "come alongside" to share in their grief, listen to them, and encourage them
- members who are experiencing significant life changes, are dealing with family concerns, or are facing serious health/wellness concerns These new teams are in addition to the Hospitality Team that has already been assisting members in planning memorial luncheons and receptions as well as planning food and beverage service for church functions.

Key to the effectiveness of these new pastoral care teams will be open, honest communication (each of us with ourselves and others) mixed with a good dose of confidentiality. Most of us love the attention and concern that comes from our friends during difficult times, but we are hesitant to actually ask for help. Some of us see ourselves as very "private" people who want to keep our troubles to ourselves or others out of our business. Some of us even see ourselves as so self-sufficient that we don't need help-that is until the troubles get big enough that we no longer know how to deal effectively with the stress or are starting to have physical illnesses of our own. So I encourage you, if you could relate to any of the above bullets yourself or know of another church member who fits one of the bullets, please contact either the church office, Pastor Mauldin, or myself (Deacon Moderator), so your name and need can be communicated to the right deacon team who will reach out to you.

We don't know just yet what all the services and opportunities will look like—we anticipate we will be on a "learning curve" for a little while, but the deacons want to be both helpful and sensitive to those members who would like support for their specific needs. We do not, however, want to be intrusive. Think of this as a "opportunity" to try something new, a way to possibly gain new coping skills, or just a way to make a new friend who will share in whatever circumstances are currently troubling you.

Pastor Nasir Minhas (many of you will remember that we skyped with him from his home in Pakistan early in the spring, just before Sunday School) was joyous to report that, "many of those who attended the meeting received Jesus and accepted Him as their personal Savior."

Our missionaries in foreign countries truly have the heart for our Lord and the talents to do what Our Lord has asked of us: To be fishers of men. Our statue in the courtyard is our constant reminder to do that work for the Lord, too.

DM: Trina, tell us about the trip. Where are you going? What will you be doing?

TO: From Dec 2-9, I will be going to El Salvador on a medical mission trip. This mission trip is organized by Hand of Hope, through Joyce Meyer Ministries, a faith-based ministry. Their medical ministry is highly organized, and I will be working with a medical team, providing health care to the population in need.

DM: You work in the medical field, right?

TO: I am a Nurse Practitioner in urgent care. I've done that since 2009. Before that, I worked in family practice. I've also worked in public health and as a flight nurse for the U.S. Air Force.

DM: So God called you to a vocation helping people medically, and now you feel a call to use your gifts and expand your ministry on this trip?

TO: I have had this in my heart, I believe, since I was a little girl—from wanting to become a Registered Nurse, Flight Nurse, later a Nurse Practitioner, with the desire to travel. I came to realize all this

preparation for my career, from public health, to the Air Force, to urgent care has led me to what really has been brewing in my heart for a long time. That is to participate in a Medical Mission. Not just what's in my heart but what God has placed in my heart, His calling and His guidance.

DM: Is this your first mission trip?

TO: Yes, it will be my first mission trip, so needless to say the excitement is there, with some jitters as well.

DM: I trust the organizers will look after your safety. What are you nervous about?

TO: It is my first mission trip. I am a little nervous and excited of the unknown. Meeting and working with medical team members for the first time makes me a little nervous, but I tend to work well in new environments, as I'm very flexible. It will also be the first time I will be away from my children for an entire week. I know they will be in good hands, but I will miss them.

DM: How did you pick El Salvador?

TO: I wanted to stay close to Florida, in the Western Hemisphere.

DM: You have three boys. Giovanni is age 12, and Adriel and Julian are twins, age 9. What do they think of your trip?

TO: When I first told them they were very excited. They love to travel, and they wanted to come along. They said they would love to go and help! I told them it was only for adults at this time. They said when they're older they want to be involved in helping and serving as well. I told them God has placed gifts and abilities in all of us; these gifts should be used to serve others. I definitely would love for all of us to be involved, as a family, some day, God willing.

DM: Tell us about your faith.

TO: I grew up in both Lutheran and Catholic faiths—Catholic mostly, because I went to a Catholic school and university. My grandmother was Presbyterian, and I was familiar going to her church as well. So as far as "religion" is concerned, I know it very well. My faith and intimate relationship with God however, is a whole other story. Experiences in my life, and having to trust the Lord in situations where I didn't have any answers, is where I started to dig deep. My passion grew to know Him more and more.

DM: What brought you to PCPC?

TO: I was born in New York and raised in Los Angeles. We moved here to Palm City in 2006. We were searching for a church relatively close to home. I decided to try PCPC. My children were already taking piano here, and I already knew several members. I have to say, since I have been here, I have been welcomed with open arms. My children and I have been blessed to be a part of the PCPC family. We became affiliated with PCPC in 2013. We became members around 2015.

DM: This is an exciting opportunity for you and for our church. Any time one of us has a ministry opportunity, we all have a share in it. How can we help? According to our policy, "Those who are invited to take significant leadership roles in the congregation shall ... agree with the Essential Tenets of ECO" [1.0305]. This means not only pastors, elders, and deacons, but everyone who teaches or exercises leadership must adhere to the Essential Tenets. Why? Because these core convictions make us who we are.

Do you know what the Essential Tenets are? What they mean? Beginning January 6, Pastor David will teach a class on the Essential Tenets. The class will last until March 10, but will not meet on January 27 because of the ECO National Gathering. That's a 9-week course on the Essentials.

The class meets from 10:00 to 11:00 on Saturday mornings in Lower Langill. Everyone is invited! ECO has a passionate, lively faith. Come learn more about and catch the exciting vision.

We call it, "Coping with the Holidays: A Grief Workshop." Valette Porter, who is completing her master's degree in Christian Counseling, will discuss practical ways to manage grief through the holidays. Our pastor, David Mauldin, will talk about grief from a Christian perspective and what it means to "grieve as those who have hope." Perhaps best of all, you will discover you are not alone. Your experiences, difficult as they are, are normal and are shared by many others.

The workshop will be held on Saturday, November 4, in Lower Langill, at 10:00am. It will last about an hour and a half.
