The Mentor Who Taught Me How to Suffer

You have to respect someone who has suffered much but has not been defeated by it. One of my mentors was like that. In fact, he became a mentor to me for that reason. There were other reasons, but this was an important one. Let me tell you about him.

He won my respect when I learned that he gave up his livelihood for the sake of conscience. He had an income from a church, but he became convinced that this church was corrupt. He wanted to honor God, and that meant giving up the money. He might have kept his convictions and the money, that. Not all suffering comes upon us from outside. Sometimes we willingly choose it for the sake of what is right. That takes faith and courage.

What he wanted for himself was the quiet, modest life of a scholar. He wanted to read and write, to learn, to teach—out of the public eye. He had no desire for controversy and contention. And yet, he was called by God to become not just a public figure, but a lightning rod of controversy. When work, he jumped in wholeheartedly.

point he was fired from his job because the people he worked for didn't like the way he did things. He married and had one son, but the boy died in infancy. Later his wife died as well, leaving him alone. As if all this were not enough, he spent years living with chronic pain. Chronic pain causes both physical and spiritual suffering. He was sometimes misunderstood, often vilified, and occasionally blamed for things that were not his fault.

Despite all this, he was a man of deep, passionate faith in Jesus Christ. If he was certain of anything, it was God's fatherly love for those who are in Christ. He turned his penetrating mind to scripture and taught that the key to life is gratitude for the grace God gives us.

He believed that everything that happens to but he had too much integrity. You have to respect us comes from our Father in heaven. This month's angel flies a little under the radar. In fact, if you're over the age of 20, you may not recognize her. This month's angel serves a multiple of ministries all geared towards our children and youth. You can see her every Sunday serving our preschool students in Sunday school. She also helps with childcare for our PCPC MOPS program and the Thursday evening Community Bible Study. When her college schedule permits, she volunteers as a middle school youth leader. She has attended every youth mission trip over the past 4 years including the recent Puerto Rico summer trip. She volunteers for the annual Gertrude Walden Children's Party and helps pass out food every time PCPC leads the Treasure Coast Food Bank dispersal. She has a genuine Christ-like heart for missions,



for children, and for service (in general). The Angel of the Month for August is Coral Vanderwiele.

This program features biblical, Christ-centered teaching that focuses on grief topics associated with the death of a loved one. The DVD seminar features nationally respected grief experts and reallife stories of people, followed by a small group discussion about what was viewed. Past participants have related how helpful the information and follow-up discussions were to them.

Many grieving people find they are only beginning the work of healing when friends or family have returned to their daily life routines. Too often people, including Christians, tend to hide their grief instead of allowing it to do the God-given work for which it is intended. Don't allow fear of what others may think to keep you from what could help you. Confidentiality is very much a part of this program.

Your bereavement experience may be recent or not so recent. You will find encouragement, comfort and help in grieving the death of a spouse, child, parent, sibling, another family member, or friend. No matter what the cause of your loved one's death, this is an opportunity to be around people who understand what you are feeling. You will learn how to recognize the symptoms of being stuck in grief, and that you do not need to live in bondage to certain emotions. You will learn valuable information about facing your new normal in life and renewing your hope for the future.

We have built part of the leadership team, but we are still looking for key personnel. We would love to have 200 elementary school children playing ball here each week.

- Special events—designed for children and their families.
- MOPS—We have an active Mothers of Preschoolers group that starts again in the fall.
- Summer Drama Camp—This continues to be effective and successful, and we plan to continue it.

We have a vision and goal. We want to love children, protect them, and train them in the way of Jesus Christ.

Having gone down simply as servants at the disposal of our hosts (Second Union Church of San Juan) to offer relief from last year's hurricane Maria, we rehabbed a volunteer community library, helped prep the church for VBS, painted & readied camp dorms (that will now be able to house future mission teams), cleared and prepped a local woman's house to finally receive roof repairs, and cleared out and cleaned another woman's house which was water-damaged from the hurricane.

This last particular woman, Alicia, was a 67-yearold, wheelchair-bound woman with polio from the age of 2, who had only gotten electricity back the week before we arrived (10 months after the storm). With no family and a single friend, our youth were a welcomed sight to her and her home. Though we were just able to clear the house down to the cement structure, it is now ready for another team to come in and paint and refloor her home (projects we would very much like to help fund and possibly finish in the near future).

Met with some hesitancy from our hosts, due to them never hosting a mission team before and with some doubts in the ability of youth to accomplish anything worthwhile, we left them amazed at what our team accomplished and with a unanimous and heartfelt standing invitation to return whenever we wanted and as soon as we could. Puerto Rico left an indelible mark on the hearts of our youth as they did on our hosts and new friends on the island. God was definitely at work in and through our students as He was and is on the island of Puerto Rico.

his power, I ought to trust God despite everything. And my mentor set an example in that!

He taught me how to suffer. I fear suffering less than before. I'd like to say I do not fear it at all, but that would be dishonest. I do have the conviction that God will see me through anything.

He taught me, when I suffer, not to torment myself by asking why. I'm not likely to get an answer to that question, nor do I need one. What I need is God. Is it enough to know that God loves me and has

a plan for me? It is if I can accept that the purpose of my life is not to have fun or live in comfort. In fact, the purpose of my life is not about me at all. It is to glorify and enjoy God. That's from the Westminster Catechism. I don't think my mentor used those words exactly, but that's what he taught and how he lived.

He taught me, when I suffer, to persevere. only thing The that overcomes my suffering is God's mercy, so I must look to God in faith—and be patient. I understand

the theory of patient enduring. I see the wisdom of it's a chance to make new friends, living and dead. If it. Now if I could just figure out how to actually do it better than I have so far ...

My mentor, as you may have figured out by now, is John Calvin. He was the great Protestant Reformer who in the 16th century taught so many people how to follow Jesus. We've been learning from him ever since. The Presbyterian Church is part of the fruit God has brought from the labors of Calvin and many others. Mentors may be living or dead. Some of the best we only know through their writings.

This month, in our Classics of Christian

Spirituality class, we will spend two weeks with Calvin. He is the only author who gets more than one week. I did this in part because it is good for Presbyterians to be familiar with Calvin. More importantly, I wanted to share the things he has taught me.

All the excerpts by Calvin come from his Institutes of the Christian Religion. On August 15, we will discuss what he wrote about faith. What is it? Where does it come from? We will also read about the Lord's Supper. More than anyone else, Calvin has helped me to understand the Lord's

Supper. His insight about the Holy Spirit's role in the Supper is absolutely brilliant. On August 22, Calvin will teach us about prayer. I chose this reading because prayer is so important, and I doubt many of us pray as we ought. We need guidance and encouragement. At the end of the study, we will read E. M. Bounds on prayer. Hearing two powerful people of prayer on this topic should be helpful.

I am excited about the Classics of Christians Spirituality class because

you are participating in the class, I challenge you to do that. Make a new friend among the folks in the class. Find a new friend who lived and wrote long ago and who inspires you.

To suffer. To pray. To live for God. Christians have been doing these things for a long time. We learn from one another how to do them, and we always do them together.
